Sentence types

We have learnt about 3 types of sentence in year four: simple, compound and complex.

Simple = must have a <u>noun</u> and a *verb*

Example: Mrs Morris walked to the shop.

Compound = two simple sentences joined with a conjunction

Example: Mrs Morris walked to the shop **because** she wanted to buy an ice-cream.

Complex = includes extra information added with commas, the <u>extra information</u> doesn't make sense on its own. The <u>extra information</u> can go at the beginning, middle or end. Look carefully to see if there are commas and how many there are.

Examples:

Beginning: In the morning, Mrs Morris walked to the shop.

Middle: Mrs Morris, in the morning, walked to the shop.

End: Mrs Morris walked to the shop in the morning.
