Religion /Worldview: Christianity	Enquiry Question: How do the events of Easter and Pentecost impact on Christians today?	Age: 10-12 Spring 2 (Alternate)
This enquiry draws on the previous learning about the Easter story, recaps it in Piece 2 and then concentrates on what happened afterwards

<p>The events of Holy Week: Palm Sunday, The Last Supper, the Crucifixion and Resurrection.</p> <p>Pentecost: the appearance of the tongues of flames on the heads of the disciples which enabled them to go out and speak in all languages to the pilgrims in Jerusalem. Pentecost is seen by many Christians as the birth of the Church as it is the first time that the news about Jesus spread outside of the local area.</p> <p>Confirmation: The Rite of Passage chosen by some Christians who have been baptised but want to make an adult commitment to God.</p>	<p>Salvation: God sent Jesus to humanity to die and to be resurrected to allow man to have a pathway back to God where he can live with God for eternity.</p> <p>Proclamation of the Gospel: Pentecost is the first proclamation of the news about Jesus to people from all over the world showing the Christian belief that God loves everyone unconditionally (Agape)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What issues or situations are there where I would like to act differently or more bravely?

<p>Pentecost: The Jewish festival of Shavuot and the day when the tongues of flames came to the disciples showing that they had received the Holy Spirit.</p> <p>Confirmation: A rite of passage in Christian traditions where a baptised person makes a mature commitment to God.</p> <p>7 Gifts of the Holy Spirit: Some Christians believe the Holy Spirit can give 7 gifts: wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety and fear of the Lord</p>	<p>Shavuot is one of the festivals where Jews from all over the world would be in Jerusalem to celebrate. This was the perfect time for the disciples to be made multilingual as these pilgrims could then take the message back to their own countries.</p> <p>Phillip converting people in Samaria is significant as Jews and Samaritans did not always agree on matters of belief (Story of the Good Samaritan)</p>	<p>A Christian today may choose to be confirmed in order to make a commitment to God. Many traditions believe that in the laying on of hands at confirmation, the candidate is requesting that the Holy Spirit come to them. Whether or not a Christian is confirmed, many will choose to pray for the Holy Spirit to help, support and guide them in difficult situations.</p>	<p>This draws on all previous Christianity Spring 2 units and explores the impact Jesus and his Spirit had on the disciples after he left them.</p> <p>Also links with Shavuot learning in Judaism Age 7-9 Enquiry 3 if this has been studied.</p>
